If a parent/caregiver or a teacher feels issues need to be discussed without the child present, then this must be arranged as a <u>separate</u> meeting.

Korean Cultural Experience

Last term our Year 6 students' focus was around Celebrations, and we were learning about different cultures from around the world. We researched various cultures' celebrations, so that we could inform/explain how these celebrations created 'Kotahitanga' (unity, connectedness, support) in their communities.

To celebrate our learning, our Year 6 students had a special Korean experience day, where the Korean consulate came and ran a traditional Korean games session with our students. This gave all of the students the opportunity to learn more about Korean culture and celebrations within their culture.



The students dressed up in traditional Korean clothing (hanbok). They played Gukgung (Archery), JegiChagi (traditional Korean game) and Tuho (another traditional Korean game). The students were also lucky enough to take home their own names written in Seoye (Korean calligraphy). This was such an incredible opportunity for the Year 6 students!
